Reflection

The account of Thomas who doubted resonates with us all; each of us has experienced doubt. Thomas missed the first appearance of Jesus to his gathered disciples simply because he was not there. Having missed his chance, he stubbornly refused to listen to the testimony of his fellow-apostles, and said that nothing would convince him except putting his hand into Jesus' wounded side. Bible commentators have criticised Thomas' absence and his doubting, but whatever the reason, Jesus gave him a second chance; he came again. Full of grace and forgiveness, Jesus invited Thomas to see and touch his wounds, and his doubts were resolved; Thomas did not need to touch the wounds of love, for he could see in Jesus' face his victory over death, his love and his mercy.

For one absence, one error of judgment, Thomas has been labelled "Doubting Thomas"- not by Christ, though. He is the God of second - and subsequent - chances, leading us deeper into our faith and our relationship with him. Thomas' experience of Jesus' grace gave him a sudden new insight. He cried out, "My Lord, and my God" – one of the most profound statements of faith in the entire New Testament, one that finally established Jesus' true identity. This astonishing statement seems to have burst from Thomas, as he realised that Jesus had truly conquered death. As we experience Christ more fully, trusting in his love, power and victory, may we also grow deeper into our Christian faith, and closer to the God who died for us.

Our Lord and our God,

At this time of fear and doubting, we come into your presence to bring to you all that is on our hearts for this troubled world.

We pray for those who doubt your power; who are in despair over lost income, ruined businesses, disrupted careers; those who are suffering poverty and deprivation, the jobless, the homeless. Lord, please motivate our government, and other world leaders, to support the poor, to introduce fair taxation that protects those with the least, to tackle climate change that threatens the wellbeing and future of our planet, and to be just and merciful to the helpless.

We pray for those who, in their grief and mourning, doubt your victory over death. We pray for your compassion and comfort on all who have lost loved ones or who are caring for those suffering with long-delayed recovery from Covid-19. Strengthen their faith; help them to trust in you.

We pray for those who doubt your goodness, in this world where injustice and ruin prevail, a world in which the wealthy nations that cause the most damage to the environment suffer the least, but where the poorest nations experience drought, flooding, crop failure and starvation. Please, Lord, reach into the hearts of those who have decisions to make, and guide them into wise and just choices, for the benefit of all.
